Exam Structure

The AP US Government exam is divided into two main sections:

1. Multiple Choice Section – 65 questions, 55 minutes. Each question offers four answer choices.
2. Free Response Section – 3 essay prompts, 45 minutes. The prompts test your analytical writing and evidence based arguments.

Both sections are scored on a 5 point scale, with the final score calculated as a weighted average of the two parts.

Scoring Breakdown

- Multiple Choice: 1 point per correct answer, 0 for incorrect or blank.
- Free Response: Each essay is scored on a 0 5 scale based on content, analysis, and writing.
- College Board aggregates the scores to produce an overall score from 1 to 5.
