

how to pierce your own nose

Using a clean marker or a small dot of non irritating ink, mark the spot where you intend to pierce. Double check the alignment to avoid piercing too close to cartilage or bone.

6. Insert the Needle

Hold the needle vertically, with the bevel (the angled side) facing the skin. Gently push the needle through the skin at a slight angle (about 45 degrees). Apply steady pressure until the needle exits the other side of the nose. It should be a quick, controlled motion.

7. Remove the Needle Carefully

Once the needle has passed through, gently pull it out. Do not twist or force it, as this can cause trauma.

8. Insert the Jewelry

Immediately slide the jewelry into the new opening. Avoid touching the jewelry with your fingers; instead, hold it with a clean glove or use a sterilized tweezers.

9. Secure the Jewelry (if necessary)

For studs, simply push the backer through the hole. For hoops, thread the hoop and secure it with a backing or a small clip. Make sure the jewelry sits snugly but not too tight.
