Selecting the Perfect Paper

Weight and Finish

Paper weight is measured in grams per square meter (gsm). Higher gsm means thicker, more durable paper:

Specialty Papers

Solution: Use high quality paper that absorbs ink well and allow sufficient drying time.

Misaligned Prints

Solution: Adjust printer settings for alignment, or use a printer that supports duplex alignment.
