

how to say goodnight in japanese

Step by Step Guide: How to Say Goodnight in Japanese

Basic Phrase: 0J0,,0Y0•0j0U0D (Oyasuminasai)

This is the most widely used goodnight greeting in Japanese. It's polite, respectful, and appropriate for almost any situation. The phrase literally means "I hope you sleep well."

Casual Version: 0J0,,0Y0• (Oyasumi)

Drop the polite "0j0U0D" ending, and you get a more relaxed version. Use this with friends, siblings, or anyone you're comfortable with. It feels natural in casual conversations.
