Nursing and Allied Health

Registered Nurses (RN)

RNs provide direct patient care, administer medications, and coordinate treatment plans. They work across hospitals, clinics, long term care facilities, and community settings.

Nurse Practitioners (NP)

Education & Training Requirements

- Pharmacist – Doctor of Pharmacy (PharmD) degree + licensing exam.
- Registered Nurse – Associate's or Bachelor's in Nursing + RN licensure.
- Clinical Laboratory Technician – Associate's degree + certification (ASCP, ABHL).
- Radiologic Technologist – Associate's degree + certification (RRT).
- Physical Therapist – Doctor of Physical Therapy (DPT) degree + licensure.
- Health Information Technician – Associate's degree + certification (RHIT, RHIA).
- Medical Coder – Certificate program + certification (CPC, CCS).
- Telemedicine Specialist – Varies; often requires background in nursing, IT, or public health.
- Biomedical Engineer – Bachelor's in Engineering + specialization in biomedical or health systems.
