- 2016 – Bob Dylan (United States) – Recognized for "his poetic songwriting that has made an indelible contribution to American literature."
- 2017 – Kazuo Ishiguro (United Kingdom) – For "his novels that reveal the intricate fabric of memory."
- 2019 – Peter Handke (Austria) – For "his lyrical and unflinching prose."
- 2020 – Louise Glück (United States) – For "her unmistakable poetic voice that speaks of the human condition."

12. 2021 – Abdulrazak Gurnah (United Kingdom) – For “his compelling narratives about migration and exile.”
13. 2022 – Annie Ernaux (France) – For her “intimate and powerful prose.”
14. 2023 – Jon Fosse (Norway) – For his “intense, poetic writing.”

2. Pulitzer Prize for Fiction

Established in 1917 by Joseph Pulitzer, this award recognizes distinguished fiction by an American author, preferably dealing with American life. The Pulitzer is highly respected in the United States and is awarded annually by Columbia University.
