1. Strengthen / Weaken the Argument

What This Type Looks Like

These questions ask you to determine which option would either strengthen the argument presented in the passage or weaken it. The passage usually contains an inference or claim that is supported by evidence.

How to Approach

1. Identify the Conclusion: Pinpoint the main claim or inference the passage is making.
2. Find the Supporting Evidence: Note the facts or reasoning the author uses to back the conclusion.
3. Look for Gaps: Determine what assumptions the argument makes that are not explicitly stated.
4. Match the Answer: Choose the option that either adds new supporting evidence (strengthen) or introduces a counterexample or undermining fact (weaken).

Common Pitfalls

- Focusing too much on the wording of the passage instead of the underlying logic.
- Choosing options that merely repeat information already in the passage.
- Misidentifying the direction of the question (strengthen vs. weaken).

2. Assumption / Inference Questions

What This Type Looks Like

These questions ask you to identify a missing assumption that must be true for the argument to hold, or to infer a

conclusion that logically follows from the passage.

How to Approach

1. Read the Passage Carefully: Highlight the premises and conclusion.
2. Ask “What Must Be True?” For an assumption question, think about what the author must be implicitly assuming.
3. For Inference Questions: Identify the logical link between premises and conclusion.
4. Eliminate Distractors: Remove options that are too obvious or that add unrelated information.
5. Select the Best Fit: The correct answer should be necessary and sufficient for the argument.

Tip for Speed

When time is limited, first skim for the conclusion, then backtrack to find the premise that supports it. This reverse engineering technique often reveals the missing assumption quickly.

3. Parallel Reasoning

What This Type Looks Like

Parallel reasoning questions present two arguments: a passage and a short statement. The task is to determine whether the short statement uses the same structure and reasoning as the passage.

How to Approach

1. Map the Structure: Write down the premises and conclusion of the passage.
2. Compare to the Short Statement: See if it follows the same pattern.
3. Check for Logical Equivalence: The statement should be logically equivalent to the passage.
4. Choose the Best Match: The correct answer will be the one that aligns with the structure.

4. Logical Inference (Inference from a Statement)

What This Type Looks Like

These questions provide a single statement (often a claim or fact) and ask you to infer something that must logically follow.

How to Approach

1. Identify the Premise: Note the key fact or claim.
2. Apply Logical Rules: Use rules like modus ponens, modus tollens, or transitivity.
3. Eliminate Over Interpretations: Avoid reading too much into the statement.
4. Choose the Correct Inference: The answer should be a logical consequence, not merely a related idea.

5. Flaw / Counterargument

What This Type Looks Like

These questions ask you to identify a flaw in the argument or a counterargument that undermines it. Unlike weaken questions, the flaw is usually a logical error or a false premise.

How to Approach

1. Spot Logical Errors: Look for contradictions, overgeneralizations, or unsupported leaps.
2. Check Assumptions: Determine if an assumption is false or unverified.
3. Match the Answer: Choose the option that best identifies the flaw.

6. Evidence/Support Questions

What This Type Looks Like

These questions ask you to identify which piece of evidence best supports a specific claim or conclusion in the passage.

How to Approach

1. Locate the Claim: Highlight the specific claim you need to support.
2. Scan for Evidence: Find the facts that directly back the claim.
3. Eliminate Irrelevant Options: Remove evidence that supports other claims.
4. Select the Best Evidence: The answer should provide the strongest, most direct support.

7. Question About the Passage Structure

What This Type Looks Like

These questions focus on the structure of the argument—how the premises are arranged, how the conclusion follows, or how the author transitions between ideas.

How to Approach

1. Outline the Argument: Write a quick schematic of premises and conclusion.
2. Identify Structural Features: Look for transitions, causal links, or comparative statements.
3. Match to the Answer: Choose the option that accurately describes the structure.

8. Ambiguous / Vague Statements

What This Type Looks Like

These questions present statements that could be interpreted in multiple ways. The task is to choose the interpretation that best fits the passage's context.

How to Approach

1. Read the Context: Understand the broader argument.
2. Consider Multiple Readings: Write down possible interpretations.
3. Eliminate Inconsistent Options: Remove interpretations that conflict with the passage.
4. Select the Most Consistent Interpretation: The correct answer aligns with the overall logic.

9. Alternative Conclusion / Counterfactual

What This Type Looks Like

These questions ask you to imagine what would happen if a different conclusion were drawn from the same premises, or to evaluate a counterfactual scenario.

How to Approach

1. Identify the Original Conclusion: Note the claim the passage makes.
2. Consider Alternative Outcomes: Think about what else could logically follow.
3. Match to the Answer: Choose the alternative that is consistent with the premises.

10. Summarize / Main Idea Questions

What This Type Looks Like

These questions ask you to identify the main idea or summarize the passage in a single sentence.

How to Approach

1. Read for the Thesis: Look for the central claim.
2. Eliminate Peripheral Details: Focus on the core argument.
3. Choose the Concise Summary: The answer should capture the essence without extra fluff.

Common Themes Across All Types

While each question type has its own nuances, several overarching strategies apply to all LSAT logical reasoning questions:

- Read Actively: Underline or highlight key phrases as you read.
- Identify the Argument's Skeleton: Premises, conclusion, assumptions.
