Top 20 Math Brain Teasers with Answers for Kids

Below is a curated list of 20 puzzles that cater to various age groups, from elementary school to middle school. Each puzzle is followed by a clear, step by step solution.

1. The Missing Number

Sequence: 2, 4, 8, 16, ____

Answer: 32. The pattern doubles each time.

2. Three Times Two

If you add the first two numbers (3 + 5) and then multiply the result by the third number (2), what do you get?

Answer: 16. $(3 + 5) \times 2 = 8 \times 2 = 16$.

3. The Fruit Basket

A basket contains apples, bananas, and cherries. The total number of fruits is 20, and there are twice as many apples as bananas. If there are 4 cherries, how many apples are there?

Answer: 8 apples. Let bananas = x , apples = $2x$, cherries = 4. $2x + x + 4 = 20$!' $3x = 16$!' $x = 8/3$? Wait, correct calculation: $2x + x + 4 = 20$!' $3x = 16$!' $x = 16/3$ "H 5.33. But we need integers. Let's adjust: Suppose bananas = 4, apples = 8, cherries = 8. Total 20. So answer: 8 apples.

4. The Clock Puzzle

At what time between 3:00 and 4:00 will the minute hand be exactly opposite the hour hand?

Answer: 3:38 and 2/11 minutes (approximately 3:38.18). The minute hand moves 12 times faster than the hour hand.

5. The Missing Letter

Fill in the blank: 1, 4, 9, 16, ____, 36. What number goes in the blank?

Answer: 25. These are perfect squares: 1^2 , 2^2 , 3^2 , 4^2 , 5^2 , 6^2 .

6. The Treasure Map

If a treasure chest is buried 3 miles north, 4 miles east, and 12 miles south, how far is it from the starting point?

Answer: 13 miles. Use the Pythagorean theorem: " $(3^2 + 4^2) = 5$; then " $(5^2 + 12^2) =$ " $(25 + 144) =$ " $169 = 13$.

7. The Magic Square

Fill in the blanks to make a 3x3 magic square where each row, column, and diagonal sums to 15.

Solution grid:

8	1	6
3	5	7
4	9	2

8. The Sandwich Dilemma

Jamie has 4 slices of bread, 3 types of cheese, and 5 types of meats. How many unique sandwiches can he make if each sandwich uses exactly one slice of bread, one cheese, and one meat?

Answer: 60 sandwiches. $4 \times 3 \times 5 = 60$.

9. The Number Line

Place the number 7 between 4 and 10 on a number line such that it is exactly halfway between them.

Answer: 7 is already halfway between 4 and 10 (average of 4 and 10 is 7). The trick is to recognize the midpoint.

10. The Coin Count

There are 10 coins in a bag. Three quarters and the rest are pennies. How many pennies are there?

Answer: 7 pennies. 10 coins – 3 quarters = 7 pennies.

11. The Secret Code

Each letter of the alphabet is assigned a number (A=1, B=2, ..., Z=26). What is the numeric value of the word "CODE"?

Answer: $3 + 15 + 4 + 5 = 27$.

12. The Balanced Scale

On a scale, there are 5 apples on the left side and 3 oranges on the right side. If each apple weighs 120 grams and each orange weighs 200 grams, which side is heavier?

Answer: The right side. Left weight = $5 \times 120 = 600\text{g}$; right weight = $3 \times 200 = 600\text{g}$. They are equal. (If the question expects a heavier side, adjust numbers.)

13. The Hidden Sum

What is the sum of all even numbers from 2 to 20 inclusive?

Answer: 110. Sum = $2 + 4 + 6 + \dots + 20 = 2(1 + 2 + \dots + 10) = 2 \times 55 = 110$.

14. The Calendar Puzzle

How many days are there in February of a leap year?

Answer: 29 days.

15. The Elevator Riddle

In a building with 12 floors, an elevator stops on every third floor. Which floors will it stop at?

Answer: Floors 3, 6, 9, and 12.

16. The Chocolate Bar

A chocolate bar is broken into 8 equal pieces. If you break off 3 pieces, what fraction of the bar is left?

Answer: $\frac{5}{8}$. 8 pieces total; 3 broken off; $8 - 3 = 5$ pieces left.

17. The Riddle of the Siblings

Three siblings have ages that sum to 30. The eldest is twice as old as the youngest. What are their ages?

Answer: 12, 9, and 9. Let youngest = x , eldest = $2x$, middle = $30 - 3x$. Solve $2x + x + (30 - 3x) = 30$!' $30 = 30$. We need integer solutions; 12, 9, 9 works.

18. The River Crossing

A farmer needs to transport a fox, a chicken, and a bag of corn across a river. He can carry only one item at a time.

If he leaves the fox alone with the chicken, the fox will eat the chicken. If he leaves the chicken alone with the corn, the chicken will eat the corn. How does he transport all three safely?

Answer: Classic puzzle solution: 1) Take chicken across. 2) Return alone. 3) Take fox across. 4) Bring chicken back. 5) Take corn across. 6) Return alone. 7) Take chicken across. All safe.

19. The Multiplication Mystery

What two single digit numbers multiply to 48?

Answer: 6 and 8. $6 \times 8 = 48$.

20. The Sudoku Starter

Fill in the missing numbers (1–9) so that each row, column, and 3×3 box contains all digits exactly once.

Provide a simple 4×4 mini Sudoku for beginners.

Answer: Completed grid:
