Adding Headlines, Subheads, and Bylines

Headlines should be bold and large, often centered or left aligned. Subheads provide context and are slightly smaller. Byline placement—usually below the headline—adds credibility. Use **Text Style** to create reusable formatting: one style for headlines, another for body text, and a third for captions.

Editing Text Boxes

Preparing for Print: Bleed, Color Profiles, and Paper Sizes

Choose a CMYK color profile if the printer requires it; otherwise, stick with RGB for simple color printing. Verify the paper size matches the printer’s specifications—most home printers use 8.5" × 11", while commercial presses may use larger sheets.
