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Introduction

3.3. Symbolic Elements: The World Serpent and the Sun

Flanking Thor are subtle references to Jörmungandr, the world serpent, and a stylized sun. These elements reinforce Thor's role in the cosmic order—maintaining balance between chaos and order, darkness and light.

4. Runic Inscriptions: Decoding the Text

4.1. The Younger Futhark Script

The stone bears an inscription in the Younger Futhark, the runic alphabet used during the Viking Age. The inscription is composed of 24 characters arranged in a single horizontal line, a common layout for commemorative stones of this period.

4.2. Translation and Interpretation

Translators have rendered the text as: "In memory of Harald, son of Erik, who built this stone for Thunor, protector of the realm." This suggests that the stone was erected by a local chieftain as an act of piety and political legitimacy.

4.3. The Role of Runic Inscriptions in Social Identity
